Camp Tejas Report

This was the thirteenth consecutive year—and the second year in Maryville, Tennessee, in the midst of the Smoky Mountains—that we have been able to have camp. Camp Tejas was originally proposed, initiated and hosted in Stephenville, Texas, in 2002 by Mrs. Jackie Wakefield, with the approval of Mr. Brisby. After our second year at her home, we looked for additional areas to explore and enjoy with the youth. That brought us to the Austin, Texas, area for our third year, Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota, for years four and five, and then to the north and south side of Lake Tahoe in Nevada for years six and seven. Next, we spent one year outside of Seattle, Washington, followed by three years at Camp Lane (in between Eugene, Oregon, and the Pacific Ocean), from where we canvassed out over the state. Each new location brings a variety of challenges but also provides a wonderful opportunity to see and experience the enjoyable American outdoors. Prior to this year's arrival in Maryville, there was considerable rain. However, we are most thankful that the weather did not impact any activities.

Mr-s. Richard Litz graciously provided their home as the base of operations for this year's camp, and we were also able to take a five-day, four-night road trip into the middle-Tennessee area, which was well-planned by Mrs. Mary Anderson. On the opening Friday we enjoyed a sunny day of water skiing, tubing, and use of the slide on the double-decker pontoon boat, captained once again by Mr. Jon Brisby. On the first Sunday, we departed for Music City, more commonly known as Nashville. This year's base camp just outside Nashville was Montgomery Bell State Park, and was really well-liked by the teens and staff (especially in comparison to last year's cabins where we had no power!). We enjoyed (four) small villas on the lake that provided a wonderful opportunity to relax and cool down, coupled with beautiful areas to grill out in the evenings. Monday was a full day and started off with a historic tour of Studio B, where famous artists like Elvis and Patsy Kline have recorded. After the session and tour of the property, we went on a walking tour of Nashville's historic Ryman Auditorium, which is best known as the original home of the Grand Ole Opry. Following that, there was a little bit of time for shopping before continuing to the twentyseventh floor of the First Tennessee Bank building, a great view of the city, for a private dinner where the teens could learn and practice their etiquette. While there, some of nature's fireworks went off and gave quite a show. It also cooled the weather for the next several days. The teens were also able to take some great pictures out on the veranda, as well as play out a mock trial (that particular floor of the building is occupied by a law firm).

Tuesday started off with a private coach tour of the stars' homes—such as Dolly Parton, Alan Jackson, and Taylor Swift—with more history of Nashville included. Lunch was taken at Centennial Park, where there was a full size reproduction of the Greek Parthenon. After lunch we went to the Opryland Hotel and walked through the incredible conservatory oasis inside the atrium. There were incredible plants, streams, and waterfalls—the perfect setting for dinner at Cascades, where we practiced more of our etiquette training. Following dinner we went to the Grand Ole Opry show at the Opry House, followed by a really cool backstage tour of the dressing rooms—which included more history of the Opry—and the teens got to take their pictures onstage! Another full day ...

On Wednesday we departed for a leisurely trip down the Cumberland River on the General Jackson Showboat. Next, we returned to Montgomery Bell State Park to enjoy our surroundings, grill out, and relax! On Thursday we cleaned up camp and drove to Nashville Shores Waterpark, where we spent a few hours before heading back to Maryville. And then what would camp be without squeezing in some Survivor and Jeopardy in the final days?

Mr. Brisby has always been an avid supporter of our youth and has seen many positive results from camp. However, it is something that is volunteer driven, and as always, this year's camp was made possible only by the dedicated service of a group of volunteers that graciously provided their time and support.
